Stair Runners

The right rug can elevate the experience of getting from one floor to another in your house.



Stair runners add style and comfort. They also preserve architectural detail on stairways.



Above This subtle allover botanical print on a dark Lackground flows gently down the stairs. Installed with waterfall method (the runner is attached only where the cread meets the riser), the flowing lines of the print contrast with the crisp lines of the wall paneling. Above Right Diamond-pattern carpets such as this one are popular choices for stair runners because they have strong lines for visual interest in both directions, often without the pattern breaking awkwardly at the nose of the stair tread. Oppo ite A strong stripe separates the stairs from the floor carpet in the entry area and accents the contrast between dark woodwork and light walls. Installed o wrap each step, the runner mphasizes the room's formal look.



Staircases can be elegant affairs of fine woodwork and great design. The treads, however, bear the daily burden. Stair runners protect wood treads, muffle footsteps, and accentuate the style of the house.

Almost any rug or carpet design can be made to serve as a runner, but some patterns work better than others. Allover patterns, stripes, and textured solid colors work well on any staircase because the pattern won't break unevenly as it flows over the treads.

Large, blocky prints; asymmetrical patterns; and large-scale, geometric patterns are more difficult to work with, as getting the pattern to break in a pleasing manner at every step might not be possible. Allowing for turns and landings adds to the difficulty in making these patterns work well.

A trim border adds definition to solid or subtly colored runners. Otherwise the edges of runners cut from carpet can be finished with a simple overstitch. Runner carpet that's woven to a standard width, usually 27 or 31 inches, will have finished edges and perhaps a border. Runner rugs can be sewn together end-to-end to create a stair runner.





STAIR RODS

While no longer used to hold the runner in place, ornamental stair rods still need to be sturdy to stand up to foot traffic. Choose a heavy-gauge rod of high-quality metal to avoid dents and pitting. Rods come in a range of metal colors and textures—from bright gold to matte silver, and smooth finishes to twists and braided looks—with finials and brackets to match.


